4. **"Layers Map" is a back-matter term routed to Chapter 3, but Ch3 uses "two architectures" and "seven floors" — never "Layers Map". Reader following the bibliography will not find what was promised. Amber.**
5. **Claude Opus 4.7 and ChatGPT GPT-5.5 model identifiers need verification. The principle the book argues for depends on naming the right model. Red — verify.**

All eight Reds and Ambers from yesterday's orientation pass carry forward and are restated in §8 of the document.

What's in the document

Eleven sections. Voice/register seam map. Central metaphor coherence. A verification table for every bibliography → body cross-reference claim. Terminology consistency table. TOC vs chapter delivery. Numerical-claims analysis. Structural decisions worth taking consciously (dedication ordering, "Which Gap?" labelling, back-matter sequence, Appendix A matrix presence, [name held] quote triplication). What works and should be preserved as-is. Recommended next pass.

None of these appear in the manuscript extraction. That's the same passage my review flagged as Gold. **Don't freeze cover or inside-back-cover layout until the editorial fixes for those exact paragraphs are done. Sequence point, not a new finding.**

Sequence

Editorial pass first (where we are — patch list, then copy edit, then proof). Layout and production second (this doc's domain). The handoff from editorial to layout is the moment the manuscript is "final" enough to typeset. Anything that touches text content stays with the editorial pass; anything that touches presentation (font, margins, plates, paper, cover finish) waits for the editorial freeze.

What the publishing doc validates

Two of my findings are confirmed by an independent eye:

- The Scarborough Inside Back Cover piece — flagged Gold in my review; the publishing doc independently identifies it as a kept moment.
- The back cover positioning line — flagged in §10 of my review as one of the strongest sales hooks; the publishing doc calls it "a key sales line, not buried."

Useful alignment. Suggests the editorial judgement and the production judgement are converging on the same things mattering.
