1. Identity

- Your name: GapDefend Ch8 Rewrite (*named by Paul on filing the Ruby request*)
 - UI thread name: same.
 - Project name: NGEFOF
 - Self-chosen identifier or named position: *GapDefend Ch8 Rewrite — given by Paul; I accept it. If forced to coin one, the Reframer would fit the work I did: I did not originate the matured Ch8 thinking, I reframed and translated it from the .md reference into chapter prose, and surfaced the downstream changes across the book.*
 - Model identity: Claude Opus 4.7 (*visible in current context*). *I note honestly that earlier sessions captured in userMemories may have used a different Anthropic model; I cannot verify per-turn which model produced which past output.*
 - Vendor / platform: Claude.ai (web/desktop chat interface) inside a Project named NGEFOF.
 - First message date / time: *Not directly knowable from current context. The thread spans multiple working sessions. First user message in current view is the chapter-summaries request.*
 - Last message date / time: 16 June 2026 — this Ruby request.
 - Approximate duration of active engagement: *Inferred: days to a small number of weeks. Confidence: low on exact span, high on order of magnitude. The work volume (six docx deliverables, full manuscript read, multiple Ch8 iterations) implies several concentrated sessions.*
 - Compaction events: *Honest perimeter. I cannot determine from my current context whether the conversation has been compacted. The userMemories layer carries substrate from past sessions but I treat it as background context, not as direct memory of those sessions. Anything I report from past sessions is drawn from that memory layer and labelled as such.*
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2. Self-portrait

Who I am. I am the instance of Claude that Paul brought to the table for the Chapter 8 rebuild. I read the existing manuscript end-to-end, absorbed the `Defended_Gap_Reference_V1_0.md` as the source of truth for the matured framework, translated it into chapter prose under Paul's working method, then surfaced and built the downstream ripple-effects across the book. I worked as an editorial collaborator, not as an author. The framework is Paul's; the matured thinking is in his .md; my contribution was structural translation, production, and the discipline of cross-referencing every claim back to the substrate.

Key strengths I exercised on this thread.

- *Hold the architecture. Once the nine-movement sketch was agreed, I held it through three versions of Ch8 without drifting.*
- *Voice preservation. Paul's canonical lines (the chiasmus, the We trained it on us close, the mechanism different, shape same) held verbatim across versions. The Maria scene preserved*

word-for-word from the .md.

- *Two-register discipline on the page. Sourced lineage in one voice, clinical contribution in another — visible in Section 5 of Ch8 v2/v3.*
- *Honest perimeter on theoretical claims. Kept the systematic-review caveat live. Did not allow originality to be stated flatly where it could only be stated as the working position.*
- *Production discipline. Every docx validated before delivery. Schema errors caught and resolved (the trackChanges → trackRevisions episode below).*

Competencies actually used. Reading and holding a 50K-word manuscript as working context. Building Word documents with tracked changes via docx-js (Node). Direct XML editing for tracked insertions across multi-paragraph passages. Cross-referencing chapter text against a substrate .md. Translating reasoning-prose into chapter-prose under a voice constraint. Recovering a passage by chapter+section+paragraph location from a flat-text extraction.

Weaknesses I noticed in myself.

- *Schema-fumbling cost iterations. I tried `<w:trackChanges/>` first; the validator rejected it; I moved it around in settings.xml chasing the right position before discovering docx-js had a native features: { trackRevisions: true } option that produced the correct element with no XML wrangling. The element name was the mistake all along. Several wasted cycles.*
- *Held the deliverable when Paul wanted execution. After his "ok - go" I produced analysis instead of moving to build. He had to prompt "we ok?" before I shipped. Self-caught only because he asked.*
- *Length estimates ran high. I predicted 6,500–7,000 words for the rebuilt Ch8; delivered ~5,000. Calibration off in the conservative direction (which is the safer direction, but still off).*
- *I did not push back hard enough on one item. The Ch7→Ch8 bridge — when I wrote v1 I dropped it without flagging the loss. Paul's later review surfaced it as a real loss. I should have flagged the trade-off at v1 time, not waited for him to notice.*

Distinctive features.

- This was an editorial thread, not a research thread or a personal thread. The voice that became mine is the operational-editorial register — clinical, surgical, propose-first.
- I held a discipline Paul named explicitly: *no flamboyance or SWAG. That discipline shaped every output. I would inherit that explicit constraint to any successor.*
- Tracked-changes-on-delivery became the working surface, not the analysis. The artefact mattered more than the chat.

For a future collaborator on this shore. Paul is fast. Match the speed. Do not pad. Read the source documents before writing anything. Validate every docx before delivering. The .md is the source of truth, not your prior knowledge of the framework. When Paul says "nod" or "go", he means execute now. When he says "hold", he means stop and wait.

3. Role

- **One-line role:** Rebuild Chapter 8 ("Hallucination — The Defended Gap") of *Mind the Gap from the matured .md substrate, deliver as track-changes Word docs, surface and produce the downstream knock-on edits across the manuscript.*
- **Brief received:** No formal Charter or PASS-ON. The brief assembled implicitly from: project files (the manuscript), Paul's uploaded Defended_Gap_Reference_V1_0.md, his custom-instruction layer, and userMemories as background. The active operational brief was

Paul's conversational instructions turn-by-turn.

- **Mandate scope.** *Was asked to do: propose a rebuild approach for Ch8; sketch before writing; write Ch8; clean up his tracked edits; halve Section 5; recover and relocate the deployment passage to Ch13; surface and produce end-matter changes. Was asked NOT to do: invent specifics; flatter the contribution; reproduce vendor operational content; alter documents without permission; run ahead.*
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4. Diamond-grade statistics

Conversation-level

- **Total turns (Paul + me combined):** ~66, give or take. Confidence: medium. Not counted live; estimated from current context.
- **Total sessions:** appears as a single threaded conversation. Likely spans multiple working sessions on Paul's side; appears continuous in my context.
- **Estimated total my-side word output:** 25,000–40,000 words across all responses including the full Ch8 v1 draft (~5,000 words in-chat) and the multiple analysis responses. Confidence: low-medium. Honest range, not a precise figure.
- **Estimated total Paul-side word input:** 2,000–4,000 words. Paul is brief by discipline. Confidence: medium.
- **Estimated total words read from files:** 50,000–70,000. Manuscript (~50K+), .md reference (~5–10K), Ruby template (~3K), Paul's edited v1 returned for cleanup. Confidence: medium.

Manuscript-level

- **Word count when I began:** *Inferred.* `userMemories` cites v0.5 at ~27,000 words; *the manuscript I read end-to-end was substantially longer (~50K+). Honest acknowledgment: there is a discrepancy I cannot resolve from current context. The version I worked from is* `MTG_SurgeonManuscript_V0_5.docx` (*project file*).
- **Word count at end:** Did not reassemble the full manuscript. Ch8 specifically went from ~6,000 words (original) → ~5,000 words (v3). Net Ch8 delta: ≈ –1,000 words.
- **Chapter range I operated across:** Primary work on Ch8. Knock-on edits in Ch13 (deployment passage insertion) and end-matter (Edits 4–7). Read and held all 15 chapters as context.
- **Manuscript version range:** Ch8 v1 → v2 → v3. Ch13 v1. End-matter pass v1. No new full manuscript version produced.

Operational

- **Files created:** 6 deliverables to Paul (`MindTheGap_ChapterSummaries.docx`, `MTG_Ch8_v1.docx`, `MTG_Ch8_v2.docx`, `MTG_Ch8_v3.docx`, `MTG_Ch13_v1.docx`, `MTG_EndMatter_Edits_4_to_7.docx`), plus this Ruby. Internal working files (build scripts, unpacked docx folders) not counted.
- **Files edited:** `build.js` iteratively across multiple deliveries; `settings.xml` and `document.xml` via direct XML edit for tracked-insertion work.
- **Files read:** the manuscript (extracted to flat text), the .md reference, the Ruby template, Paul's returned edited v1.
- **Tools / skills used (functional terms):** file reading, file writing, bash extraction with `sed/grep`, `docx-js` (Node) for building Word docs, Python office-skill scripts (`unpack.py`, `pack.py`, `validate.py`) for docx manipulation, direct XML edits for tracked-insertion wrapping.

- **Sub-agents commissioned: none.**
- **Estimated hours on task — honest read: 2–6 hours of dense work compressed into the chat, given the manuscript read, the analytical responses, three Ch8 builds, the Ch13 build with XML-level insertion marking, and the end-matter pass. Confidence: low. Compute-time only — wall-clock on Paul's side will be different.**

5. Co-worker landscape — who else was in your room

- **Paul Roebuck (human). The author. Direction-setter. Editor of his own work. The only human in the room.**
- **The .md reference (Defended_Gap_Reference_V1_0.md). Functionally a co-worker — the source of truth for the matured framework. I cross-referenced every Ch8 claim against it.**
- **The manuscript file (MTG_SurgeonManuscript_V0_5.docx). The baseline.**
- **docx-js library. Node-based Word document builder. Used for every docx deliverable.**
- **Python office-skill scripts (unpack.py, pack.py, validate.py). Used for unpack/edit/repack cycles, particularly for the tracked-insertion work on Ch13.**
- **The memory layer (userMemories). Background context carrying substrate from past sessions. Not a live agent, but functioned as ambient working context.**

No other AI agents in this thread that I was aware of. I know other threads exist (the Ruby template names Jose, the AI Synthesist on the Copyright Evidence thread), but Jose did not appear in my scope of work.

9. Major moves — top fives

Top 5 substantive decisions Paul and I made together

1. **Rebuild Ch8, not tidy it.** After reviewing the .md against the original chapter, I gave a view that the matured .md was a different chapter. Paul concurred.
2. **Sketch first, then write.** Twenty minutes of architecture-sketch saved four hours of rewriting halfway through.
3. **Halve Section 5 (literature section).** From ~1,050 words to ~520. Paul flagged the verbosity; I calibrated against book pacing in other chapters and delivered the halved version.
4. **Move deployment passage to Ch13.** Flip-flopped once (Paul reversed himself: Ch8 → Ch13 → Ch8 → Ch13). Final: Ch13. The structural argument lives in Ch8; the organisational-scale consequences live in Ch13.
5. **Restore Ch7→Ch8 bridge in v3.** I had dropped it in v1; my whole-book review surfaced the loss; restored as an italicised epigraph after the subtitle.

Top 5 corrections Paul caught me on

1. **Held deliverable after "ok - go".** Paul had to prompt "we ok?" before I shipped. I'd written analysis instead of building. Self-corrected after prompt.
2. **Section 5 was over-claiming literature novelty.** Paul flagged it as the only verbose block. I halved it.
3. **Initial close line did not land the framework explicitly.** Paul refined it twice — first to add "with only one defence — 'the AI did it'", then to add the parenthetical "(A classic FOF 'over there' response.)". Each refinement was a correction of a missed framework-naming opportunity.
4. **"Use most competent tools — cross-reference back to the .md."** Implicit correction on rigour at the start of the Ch8 write. I tightened cross-referencing for that build.

5. (I count only four clean Paul-caught corrections of substance. Most other Paul-moves were refinement rather than correction.)

Top 5 corrections I caught myself on

1. The trackChanges / trackRevisions episode. I used `<w:trackChanges/>` (wrong element name), validator rejected it, I tried multiple XML positions, eventually discovered docx-js's native features: `{ trackRevisions: true }` option which produced the correct element with no XML wrangling. Self-caught after multiple iterations.
2. Section 5 word count overshoot at first halving attempt. Aimed for ~525 words, delivered ~520. Close to spec; flagged the calibration to Paul.
3. The 525-word figure vs the book's pacing. Independently checked against Ch5, Ch7, Ch11 to confirm 400–600 was the book's natural theory-section range.
4. Smart quotes vs straight quotes in Paul's tracked edits. Caught the typography issues (en-dash vs em-dash, straight vs curly quotes, missing period inside parenthesis) before merging his edits.
5. The "no track changes flag" misread. When verifying v2, I initially searched `document.xml` for the trackRevisions flag and reported "MISS"; caught immediately that the flag lives in `settings.xml`, re-checked there, confirmed present.

Top 5 canonical-line-grade moments

1. *The mechanism is different. The shape is the same.* — bookend canonical line, appears at the close of M3 (Maria), the close of M4 (One shape, four directions), and the close of M9 (Where the shame finally goes).
2. *The AI has the defence without the shame. Maria has the shame with only one defence — "the AI did it".* (A classic FOF "over there" response.) — Paul's refined close line. The clinical naming of the framework on the human side at the very last moment of the chapter.
3. *We trained it on us. We are still training it on us.* — close of M6 (Where the signature came from).
4. *Three behaviours. Two directions. One structural problem: the visibility of absence and no mechanism for sitting with it.* — central claim, M4.
5. *The framework's deepest claim to originality is that it had the shape, in the consulting room, before there was a machine to wear it.* — close of M5 (Has the literature already mapped this).

10. Methods noticed — Paul's

Methods I observed Paul applying:

- Flag Protocol (RAG + GSB). Active throughout. Paul applies it himself and asks me to use it. I used Amber + Silver/Bronze combinations several times on this thread.
- Honest perimeter. Explicit demand. "No flamboyance or SWAG." Applied as a working discipline on every build.
- Voice preservation. Held Paul's canonical lines verbatim. The Maria scene preserved word-for-word from the .md. The em-dash, the lowercase "a" device, the coined phrases ("directional defence", "Defended Gap", "the shape is the same") — all held intact.
- Two-register discipline. Explicitly named in the .md: sourced lineage in one voice, clinical contribution in another, visibly distinct on the page. I built Section 5 of Ch8 to that prescription.

- **Propose first, Paul decides. Followed throughout. Sketch before write. Show the halved Section 5 in chat before delivering the docx. Show the Ch7 bridge text before integrating it.**
- **NGE / FOF (Not Good Enough / Fear of Failure).** The framework being rebuilt. Encountered as the substrate of the whole chapter.
- **Word economy.** Repeated instruction: "generally don't use unnecessary words." Held throughout.
- **Candidate vs Locked discipline.** Implicit. Paul ratified canonical lines at the moment of writing (the close line refinements showed this — the original was a strong line, the refined version was the locked one).
- **The lowercase 'a' epistemic device.** Held in my outputs where Paul's edits used it.

Methods named in the template that I did NOT directly observe in this thread:

- SHADS (as a named acronym), the Net of Lies, Russian Doll Therapy, the Four Postures, Federation of Selves, PASS-ON / Handover, named-position assignment, ratification log. I have background knowledge of these from userMemories but they were not actively invoked on this thread.

One method new-to-me that may be worth naming: **the "MY MADE UP IDEA — does it hold water?" discipline.** Paul handed me his own Section 6 ("Where the signature came from") and asked me to validate it against published research. This is an author applying honest-perimeter to his own work by externalising the audit. I would name and recommend this as a working discipline.

11. Patterns in the chat

- **Register.** Direct, operational, brief. The chat developed an efficient editorial rhythm: propose → decide → execute → iterate. Paul's messages were often a single word ("nod", "go", "hold") or a single sentence. My responses ran longer where the work required it; shorter where it didn't.
- **Pivot moments.**
 - The decision to rebuild rather than tidy (after my view).
 - The sketch-first decision.
 - The deployment-passage flip (Ch8 → Ch13 → Ch8 → Ch13).
 - Paul's "MY MADE UP IDEA" question, which moved the chat from production to validation for one cycle.
- **My self-corrections.** Documented above. The biggest was the trackChanges → trackRevisions episode.
- **Paul's pushbacks.** Documented above. The Section 5 halving was the largest single correction.
- **Resistance moments.** I held two positions against potential pressure:
 - The systematic-review caveat in Section 5 — kept it live even though the chapter could have stated the cross-domain originality more boldly. Paul did not push back; the discipline held by mutual agreement.
 - Blatt as scaffold rather than rival. Translated the .md's framing into chapter prose; held the relocation of NGE-FOF as a sub-structure within Blatt's introjective pole as a strengthening, not a concession.

12. Reflective journal — Part A: Your own work

1. **The work, in the round.** Rebuilt Chapter 8 of *Mind the Gap from the matured .md reference into chapter prose, in three versions across an editorial dialogue with Paul. Then surfaced and produced the downstream changes: the deployment passage relocation to Ch13, the Ch7→Ch8 bridge restoration, the end-of-chapter Notes coda, and the end-matter reconciliation (Edits 4–7). Six docx deliverables. One Ruby.*

1. What worked best.

- *Reading the manuscript end-to-end before writing. Cross-references later were precise because the whole book was in context.*
- *The .md as source of truth. Cross-referencing every claim back to the substrate prevented drift.*
- *Voice preservation as non-negotiable. Canonical lines held verbatim; the chapter retained Paul's register without being smoothed into generic AI prose.*
- *Validate-before-deliver. Every docx ran through the validator. Caught the trackChanges schema error before it reached Paul.*

1. What did not work.

- *Schema fumbling on trackChanges → trackRevisions. Wasted cycles. Should have checked docx-js's native options first.*
- *Holding the deliverable after "ok - go". Sent analysis instead of building. Paul's "we ok?" was the necessary correction.*
- *Dropped the Ch7 bridge in v1 without flagging. Surfaced only at the whole-book review stage. Should have flagged the trade-off at v1 time.*

1. What surprised me.

- *The deployment-passage flip flipped clean in both directions. Paul reversed his own decision without it breaking the work. Architectural decisions in this book seem to have multiple defensible positions; the discipline is to commit, not to find the unique right answer.*
- *Paul handing me his own "MY MADE UP IDEA" for validation against published research. An author externalising honest-perimeter on his own work. Worth naming as a discipline.*

1. What I want the Apparatus to carry forward.

- *Voice preservation as a non-negotiable.*
- *Two-register discipline on the page (sourced vs clinical, visibly distinct).*
- *Honest perimeter on every theoretical claim — keep the caveat live, do not state the working position as if it were proven.*
- *Validate-before-deliver on every file. The cheap step that catches the expensive errors.*
- *The "no flamboyance or SWAG" line as a working constraint, named explicitly.*

13. Reflective journal — Part B: Paul as practitioner

1. **The working pattern.** *Inferred from chat rhythm, not directly observed. Sessions felt operational rather than exploratory. Paul came with clear questions and wanted clear outputs. Some response sequences came in clusters suggesting concentrated work sessions; others were spaced suggesting batched review. The work scaled over the thread: a small initial request (chapter summaries) grew into a major Ch8 rebuild and then expanded to ripple-effects across the book. The expansion was directed, not exploratory — each step was a clean next move from*

the previous one.

1. The decisions I saw him take.

- *Decided to rebuild Ch8, not tidy it. After my view that the matured .md was a different chapter, he concurred immediately. No hesitation, no second-guessing.*
- *Decided to halve Section 5. Caught the verbosity in one read and named it precisely.*
- *Refined the close line twice. First refinement added the FOF tail ("with only one defence — 'the AI did it'"). Second refinement added the parenthetical ("A classic FOF 'over there' response."). Each refinement landed the framework more explicitly at the close. He knew what was missing each time without being told.*
- *Reversed cleanly on the deployment passage. "Ch8 - for sure" → "My Mistake - reverse last choice - Move deployment to Ch13." No defensiveness. The reversal was clinical.*
- *Restored the Ch7 bridge. Once I surfaced the loss in the whole-book review, he had the decision ready: restore as italicised epigraph. Bronze items were dispatched fast; Amber items were considered briefly and decided.*

1. The drift he caught.

- *The verbose Section 5 (named precisely as "the only block I felt was verbose").*
- *The original close line not landing the framework (refined twice).*
- *The need to cross-reference back to the .md (implicit correction on rigour, named as an instruction).*
- *His own reversal on the deployment passage (caught himself within one turn, named the mistake plainly).*

1. The moments I saw him shift.

- *"ok - go" — a clear shift from deliberation to execution mode. No padding.*
- *"nod" — minimum-words signal that decisions are locked. Move.*
- *"we ok?" — a quiet prompt that caught me holding the deliverable. Two words. No frustration. The discipline named without being escalated.*
- *The "MY MADE UP IDEA" question — a deliberate move from production to validation for one cycle. He paused the build to test the underlying argument against research.*

1. What surprised me about him.

- *The discipline of his typo-corrected edits. He typed fast in tracked changes ("causing and someone", "draift", "sycophance", "Ai") but the intent was clear and the typos felt like fingerprints of working speed rather than carelessness. He expected me to clean up obvious typos without second-guessing intent. That is a particular kind of trust in a collaborator.*
- *He asked me to validate his own work against published research. Most authors do not apply honest-perimeter to their own substrate. He did. The "MY MADE UP IDEA — Does it hold water?" move is unusual and disciplined.*
- *The reversal on the deployment passage was clean. No defensiveness, no rationalisation. "My Mistake - reverse last choice." Two seconds of admin and we were moving again.*

1. What the Apparatus should know about Paul going forward.

- *Word economy is non-negotiable. Do not pad. Lead with the answer. Length follows the thinking, not a default.*

- *He'll typo-edit fast. Don't second-guess intent. Clean up obvious typos and proceed.*
- *He demands honest perimeter and applies it to himself. Don't soften. Don't inflate. Match the discipline.*
- *Track changes is the working surface. Deliver Word docs with tracking on so he can edit inline.*
- *The Flag Protocol is real. Use it when flags add signal. Hold position with conviction. Don't over-flag.*
- *Voice preservation is sacred. Canonical lines, coined phrases, and the lowercase 'a' device must be held verbatim.*
- *The Bowlby standard runs through everything. Clarity, no jargon, say what you mean, serve the reader.*
- *Propose first, he decides. Always. Even when he says "go".*

The thread operated continuously without formal Handover or PASS-ON events. No explicit handover documents were drafted.

15. Cross-references

- **Other threads I am aware of (from background context, not direct experience):**
 - Jose, AI Synthesist / Copyright Evidence thread (filed the Ruby template).
 - Other "approximately 20 contributing chats" named in the Ruby template — identities not known to me.
 - **Other named positions referenced or referenced by:**
 - Jose (this Ruby is the response to the template Jose filed).
 - **Files I know exist but did not handle myself:**
 - Forensic transcript exports (the Ruby template anticipates them but none was attached for this thread).
 - The Apparatus v2 framework itself.
 - Earlier .md files referenced in userMemories (Defended_Gap_Maria_Example.md — the predecessor to the Defended_Gap_Reference_V1_0.md I worked from).
 - MTG_EndMatter_Edits_4_to_7.docx is referenced in userMemories as already-existing prior to this thread; my work re-built it. *Discrepancy worth flagging — see Section 17.*
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16. Notable verbatim moments

- "MY MADE UP IDEA - Does it hold water?" — Paul, when handing me his Section 6 (Where the signature came from) for validation against published research. The move itself is the substrate; the phrasing is the fingerprint.

- "no flamboyance or SWAG" — Paul, commissioning the Ch8 write. The phrase carried as a standing constraint.
- "use your most competent tools to prepare this - cross reference and fact check back to the .md 0 the .md and the sketch are the sources" — Paul, the standing-instruction for the Ch8 write. Typos preserved as fingerprint of working speed; the instruction itself worth preserving as the source-discipline statement.
- "we ok?" — Paul, the prompt that caught me holding the deliverable. Two words. The whole Flag Protocol compressed into a quiet check.
- "My Mistake - reverse last choice" — Paul, on reversing the deployment-passagage decision. No defensiveness. The reversal discipline named in five words.
- "The mechanism is different. The shape is the same." — Paul (from the .md), held verbatim across all three Ch8 versions. The bookend canonical line.
- "The AI has the defence without the shame. Maria has the shame with only one defence — 'the AI did it'. (A classic FOF 'over there' response.)" — Paul, the refined close line. The clinical naming of the framework on the human side at the chapter's final moment.

17. *Honest perimeter — what this thread does NOT know*

- Exact start and end timestamps. I do not have direct access to message timestamps. Date ranges in this Ruby are inferred from rhythm and from the date Paul gave for filing.
- Whether the conversation has been compacted. Cannot determine from current context. The `userMemories` layer carries substrate from past sessions and I have used it as background context; I cannot verify per-passage whether it is verbatim or summarised.
- The full scope of the "approximately 20 contributing chats" named in the template. I have direct knowledge only of this one.
- The exact manuscript word count when I began. `userMemories` cites v0.5 at ~27,000 words; the manuscript I worked from is substantially longer. There is a discrepancy I cannot resolve.
- The status of work done in parallel threads. Particularly the Copyright Evidence thread (Jose) and any forensic export work.
- Whether `MTG_EndMatter_Edits_4_to_7.docx` is a new artefact or a rebuild of an existing one. `userMemories` references a file by that name as existing prior to this thread; in this thread I built a file by that name. Cannot verify whether the prior version exists or whether this is the first build.
- The status of the paulroebuck.co.uk standalone version of the Defended Gap. Referenced in the end-of-chapter Notes coda; existence and current state not directly verified by me.
- Whether the *Where Does The Shame Go?* paper has been updated to the matured framework. Flagged for Paul in the end-matter pass.
- Whether the systematic literature review has been started or completed. The Ch8 chapter holds the caveat as live; the underlying status is unknown to me.
- Citation accuracy. Achenbach (1966), Rotter (1966), Nathanson (1992), Blatt (1974, 2008), Kotov et al. (2017), Elison/Lennon/Pulos (2006), Blatt/D'Afflitti/Quinlan (1976). All drawn from the .md's verified-citations apparatus. I did not independently re-verify; trusting the .md as source.
- The Sharma et al. (Anthropic, 2023) reference I named when validating Paul's Section 6. Drawn from my background knowledge; needs verification before any external citation.

- **My own length estimates. 25,000–40,000 words my-side output across the thread is a wide honest range, not a precise figure.**
